Please help end daily gridlock at **Staples Road junction**

Hills Amenity Society is again appealing to the police to take control of the daily gridlock at the Staples Road/Queens **Road and York Hill** iunction.


The annual meeting heard that parents park 'almost anywhere' to drop off children at Staples Road School. In a letter to the police, Hills chairman,



Peter Smith. writes that he first drew police attention to the problem in March 2002. 'At our recent annual meeting a number of residents again raised their concerns. Parking on pavements, yellow lines, dangerous parking at the road junction and even double parking cause major gridlock.

'Residents at the Shaftesbury Road end of Staples Road are unable to get either in or out of their homes. Emergency vehicles cannot reach these properties during these times.' He says that, despite promises for action by

Chigwell councillors press through 'Chigwellisation'in the Hills

Out in the rural areas of Essex and Suffolk they know it as 'Chigwellisation' - boundary to boundary extensions behind swanky iron gates, hard-line drives bereft of trees. You know the template.

Small wonder, then, it was councillors from Chigwell, backed by those from Buckhurst Hill, who forced through approval for conversion of modest 11 Woodbury on its narrow-frontage site into a three-storey, split level six bedroom, six bathroom mansion.

The chairman's casting vote broke the 5/5 knifeedge split after Loughton Town Council also abandoned its opposition.

Regrettably the moment of approval gave vent to some extremely un-neighbourly vocal, air-punching and wagon-screeching behaviour, Hills Amenity Society heard at its subsequent meeting.



The Hills Committee has now written putting the District Council on notice that it must enforce the terms of the application in respect of trees and established hedging - unlike at Southbank, York Hill, where the Council admits this has not exactly been the case amid the massive earth works going on there

Once upon a time the property at 21 Staples Road was a sweet shop and its special character remains an important part of the Staples Road Conservation Area, believes the Hills Amenity Society Committee.

A letter has gone from the Hills expressing concern about plans to alter substantially both the front and the rear of this character property.

...but too late to save our Kings Head pub

The Kings Head, which briefly and unsuccessfully became The Fox (remember that?) at the bottom of York Hill and Chirch Hill is now being reconstructed as a pizzeria. We long ago stopped asking whether there is room for yet another eatery in Loughton!

Flats at 12-30 Church Hill A number of residents in Church Hill have joined Hills Amenity Society—even though they live outside the conservation area—to unite in protest against the huge flat development planned for 12-30 Church Hill.

The application has yet to reappear at Epping Forest District Council..

The size and height would be completely out of character with the surrounding area and would mean loss of privacy for existing properties, including those in Queens Road. Anyone wishing to be involved in a campaign against these plans should contact Steve, Maureen or Alan on 8502 2286.



Planning Update...

Rose Cottage, 43 York Hill—has now gone to appeal. Substantial increase in the size, the felling of trees and demolition of the historic outbuildings prompted rejection by Epping Forest District Council.

Southbank, York Hill: As excavation has continued one listed tree was felled with permission from EFDC and replaced with a new model. Holly hedging on the north noundary listed to remain has been removed and plans have been submitted for replanting.

33 Brancaster

Place—A proposal to

remove a horse chestnut tree has now gone to appeal.

2 Church Close—Plans have gone to appeal. The Hills Amenity Committee is objecting to this proposal.

2 Potters Close—Plans for dining room extension and conservatory approved.

Gladleys—whom many have taken to their hearts —has applied for a new shop[front.

You may have noticed that work has stopped on the development of houses on the south side of Church Hill just up from the Esso garage. Hills Committee was told that the height of the buildings exceeded that for which permission was granted—by an appreciable amount. "Discussions" are now taking place between the developers and the Council. It will be most interesting to learn of the outcome!



Police help

Noise Disturbance top of York Hill

It has been brought to our attention by residents of the continued disturbances by young people very late at night and during the early hours of the morning on the green opposite the Gardeners Arms pub in York Hill. It would appear that this area has become a meeting place for the consumption of alcohol and possibly the use of drugs. This anti-social behaviour is of great worry to the many residents who live adjoining this area.

We understand that at times

The water leak has, he says, now been fixed and pressure is being put on the Forest Conservators to redirect the seepage from the forest.

While on Staples Road/York Hill green, hopefully some residents, at least, will applaud the tidier state now that the grass has been cut?

these young people also congregate towards the bottom end of Woodbury Hill with the same result.

Please could you let us know what action you are proposing to take concerning these problems.

In conclusion, I look forward to hearing from you regarding all the above matters. If you feel that a meeting would be beneficial then I would be happy to attend as the Hills Amenity Society does represent approximately 600 residents in the aforementioned areas.

Forget gritting of roads in The Hills in icy periods. That's the message from Essex County Council Principal Engineer Trevor Barnard, who told Hills Committee: 'The County Council, as Highway Authority, determine the policy and extent of the winter service and their policy states that the network of roads to be salted during the winter period shall include 'A' and 'B' roads, access to routes for emergency services and public service bus routes carrying four or more buses per day, five days a week.

I am afraid that the roads you mention do not meet any of these ctriteria.

The highway authority has a responsibility to maintain the highway under the Highways Act 1980.

The presence of snow and ice on the road or footway does not make it out of repair and therefore

the removal of snow and ice, and indeed prevention of it's formation is not a statutory

requirement of the highway authority or it's agents.

"I would like to know if the Council would be liable in the case of an accident," he wrote.
